Spring Street Promenade

END LOCATION: Promenade Roundabout at the opposite end of Spring Street from the tour's start location

To promenade means to stroll in a public place for pleasure, often on a broad path designed for pedestrians. Created for CicLAvia, the Spring Street Promenade will expand the sidewalk for wandering in downtown. Artist and organizer Sara Daleiden and facilitator Ron Milam will guide a series of walking tours which begin at the Promenade Roundabouts, located at 1st and Spring and at 7th and Spring. Interpretive walking activities will focus on the historic core and current redevelopment efforts to muse on architecture, streetscape design, social services and other cultural resources of this fascinating urban environment.

Boyle Heights

Join urban practitioner and cultural producer John Arroyo for a leisurely cultural tour of Boyle Heights, starting from the active, lush green space of Hollenbeck Park. Walking on and around the CicLAvia route, this tour will explore the rich terrain of the neighborhood with diverse immigrant histories and progressive community centers. The tour will culminate by overlooking the Los Angeles River to discuss the master plan for river revitalization.

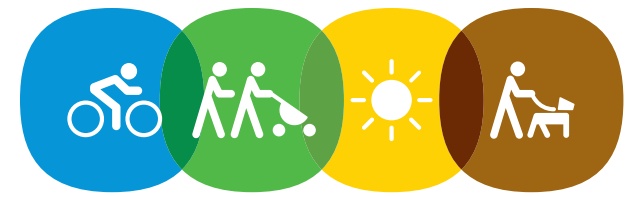

Highlighted Activities:

1. BACK (IN TIME) DROPS: Several backdrops of archival images of LA located throughout CicLAvia. Created by Maryam Hosseinzadeh and Katie Bachler.

2. ATABEY: A group dedicated to preserving Afro-Puerto Rican history and culture through music, dance, and song.

3. MUSICAL CONSORTIUM: A group of professional musicians of diverse styles and genres, including classical, punk, Brazilian, reggae, funk, and rock

4. THE LOS ANGELES HARD JUMPERZ: Young people united by their passion for Jumpstyle, a unique type of dance that incorporates hard beats and sharp, air-fueled movement.

5. BALI & BEYOND: Presenting "Gong CicLA," a duo performing a rich variety of Balinese Gamelan music.

6. THE SYCONS: Solar-powered DJs, audio and visual artists, and activists for alternative energy and transportation.

7. DODGEBALL: Friendly dodgeball games, free and open to all. The Eagle Rock Yacht Club also provides shaded seating for spectators, and bike parking.

8. SOUND FOREST: An interactive sound installation using a combination of traditional percussion instruments and found objects. Created by Alan Nakagawa.

9. 10 MILE BODIES: Participants move through the Fashion District, connecting to one another with Velcro, zippers, buttons, and string. Conceived of by Alexis Disselkoen and Paul Pescador.

10. STREET CHESS: CicLAvia participants are invited to play a street-scale game of chess with a 9'x 9' board and pieces measuring 2-3 feet tall. Created by Roman Jaster.

11. SNAP YOURSELF: A photo booth on wheels travels the CicLAvia route, taking photos upon request, which subjects can download later, free of charge.

12. BUNNY REST STOP: A costumed colony of furry pranksters provide CicLAvia participants with a shady place and good music for carrot-juice-fueled fun.

13. FANDANGO FAMILIA: A multi-generational group of students dedicated to learning Son Jarocho, the traditional music of southern Veracruz, Mexico.
